Amen.




Introduction

February 8th is International Day of Prayer and Awareness Against Human Trafficking, in memory of St. Josephine Bakhita, a Sudanese woman who was a victim of human trafficking in the 19th century and fought against slavery. Her feast day has become a day to raise awareness about the importance of protecting trafficking victims and fighting this injustice.

Suggestions for the Word of God

Isaiah 58:6

"Is not this the kind of fasting I have chosen: to loose the chains of injustice and untie the cords of the yoke, to set the oppressed free and break every yoke?" This verse reminds us of the call to fight against oppression, to set free those who are bound, and to seek justice for the vulnerable. It's an invitation to act and bring justice for those who suffer. Luke 4:18-19

"The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

These words of Jesus remind us that He came to free the oppressed and the captives. He invites us to follow His example and fight for the freedom of those who suffer from human trafficking.



Proverbs 31:8-9

"Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves, for the rights of all who are destitute. Speak up and judge fairly; defend the rights of the poor and needy."

This verse emphasizes the importance of being defenders of those who have no voice, such as the victims of human trafficking. It calls us to fight for justice and defend the most vulnerable

Denunciation of slavery

Claret considered slavery to be an immoral institution contrary to Christian principles. In his homilies and writings, he denounced slavery as a form of oppression and exploitation.

Defense of human dignity

Claret defended the human dignity of slaves, emphasizing that they were children of God and deserved to be treated with respect and dignity. He advocated for their freedom and the abolition of slavery.

Material and spiritual assistance

Claret provided material and spiritual assistance to slaves. He regularly visited plantations and barracks, where he preached and administered sacraments. He also distributed food, clothing, and medicine among the slaves.

Promotion of education

Claret considered education to be key to the liberation of slaves. He promoted the education of slaves, establishing schools and training programs for them.



Opposition to the slave trade

Claret firmly opposed the slave trade, which was a common practice in Cuba during his time. He denounced the trade as a form of exploitation and oppression, and advocated for its abolition.

Influence on the abolition of slavery


Although Claret did not live to see the abolition of slavery in Cuba, his work and defense of the rights of slaves contributed to creating a climate of opinion that favored abolition. Slavery was finally abolished in Cuba in 1886.
